

What shall I do ...

We recognise that there are lots of different scenarios that students, parents and carers might be confronted with this term, now that schools and colleges have reopened, and with the backdrop of continuing cases of coronavirus in the community.

The table below sets out what you, as a student, should do in different Covid-19 situations. This is both to ensure that you and others are kept safe in situations where it is not appropriate for you to attend college, and to avoid disruption to your education when it is safe to continue attending. This information is based on the most up to date guidance provided by Public Health England, which we keep under constant review. You should review this information in detail if you feel you might potentially have been exposed to coronavirus, directly or indirectly.

... I am unwell but do not have covid symptoms (eg, I have more general cold or flu symptoms, sore throat, headache)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> You do not need to self-isolate Decide whether you feel well enough to attend college, as you would in normal circumstances 	... as soon as you feel well enough to be in college
... I have tested positive for Covid-19	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Do not come into college Contact college urgently to inform us You must self-isolate for 10 days, and members of your household for 14 days We will discuss with you the people at college that you have had close contact with so that we can advise others, as necessary Others in your household should self-isolate 	... after 10 days from symptoms starting, even if you still have a cough or loss of taste/smell, but not if you still have a high temperature. However, you should take medical advice if you still feel unwell.
...someone in my household has Covid-19 symptoms	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Do not come into college Contact college to inform us of your situation and your absence Others in your household should self-isolate for 14 days, or until the person with symptoms has a negative result You should not get a test yourself unless you also have Covid-19 symptoms 	...as soon as their test result is negative
...someone in my household tests positive for Covid-19	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Do not come into college Contact college urgently to inform us Others in your household should self-isolate for 14 days You should not get a 	...after 14 days, provided you do not develop Covid-19 symptoms. If you do develop symptoms, you should not return to college until 10 days after the start of

...I have been in contact with someone that has Covid-19 symptoms	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> You should continue attending college as normal The person with symptoms will self-isolate and get a test. You should only self-isolate if you are told to do so by college or NHS test and trace, following the result of that test You should not get a test yourself unless you also have Covid-19 symptoms 	...continue attending as normal
...I have been in contact with someone that has had a positive test result for Covid-19	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> NHS test and trace and the college will determine who is required to self-isolate and will communicate with those affected Unless you have been notified by college or NHS test and trace, you should continue attending college as normal You will be notified by college or NHS test and trace if you are required to self-isolate You should not get a test yourself unless you also have Covid-19 symptoms 	... continue attending as normal unless notified otherwise
...someone in my household has been in contact with someone either with Covid-19 symptoms or a positive test	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> You should continue attending college as normal You will not be asked to self-isolate if you have not come into direct contact with someone with suspected or confirmed coronavirus You should not get a test yourself unless you also have Covid-19 symptoms 	...continue attending as normal
...NHS test and trace has identified me as someone that has	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Do not come to college Contact college to notify us of your absence and your situation 	...after 14 days

...my sibling (either at Camphill Wakefield or a different school / college) has been asked to self-isolate because they have been in contact with someone with a positive test, or their school has closed because of coronavirus	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> You should continue attending college 	...continue attending as normal
...I have received medical advice that I should self-isolate, for example in advance of medical surgery	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> If you have been directed to self-isolate by the NHS then you should not attend college and should notify the college immediately of your circumstances If you have been advised to self-isolate then please contact college to discuss your circumstances 	... follow the advice you receive from your doctors and keep college informed
